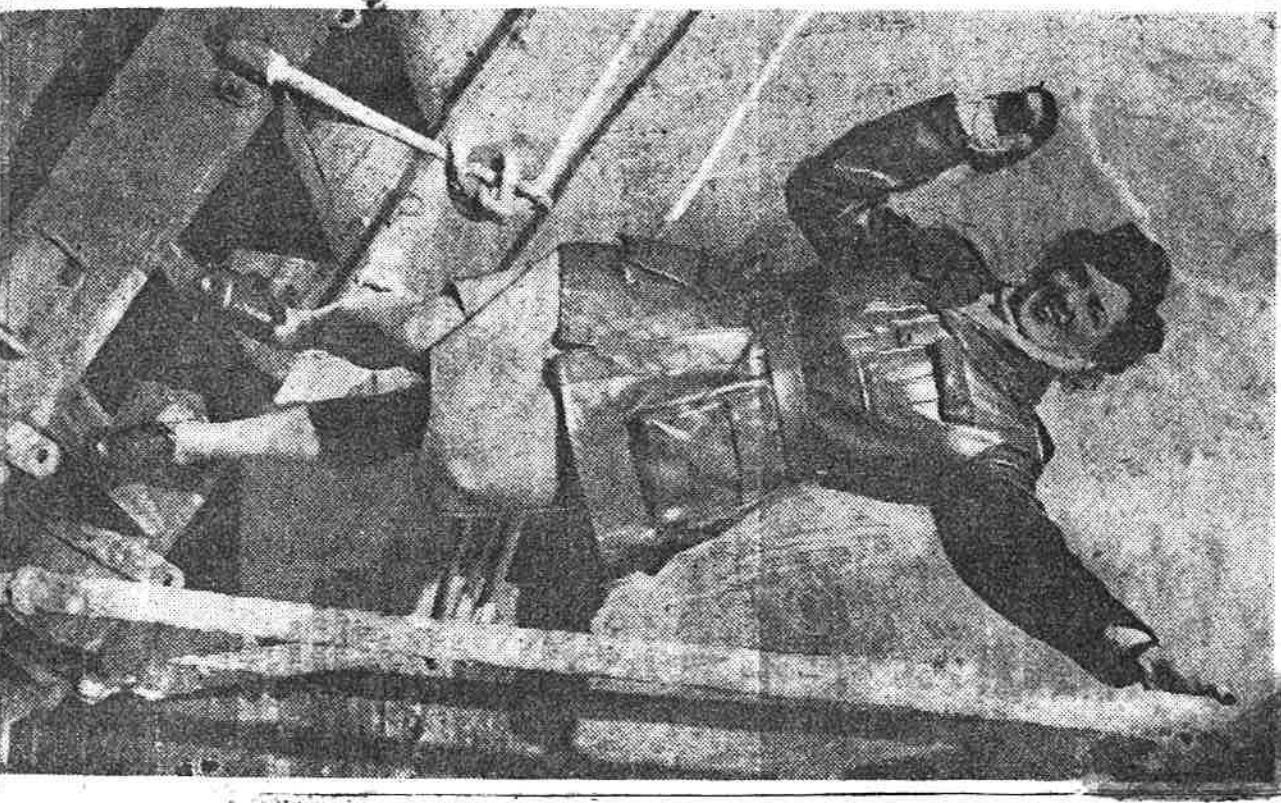


She'll Seek New Career in U.S.

Polish Girl, Heroine of Underground, Wants to be a Dress Designer

Wearing a WAC uniform, an active, brown-haired Polish girl who worked with the underground and later for American Army Intelligence, arrived in Philadelphia today with hopes of a new career.

"I want to be a dress designer," said Miss Nika Kohn, 23, a native of Warsaw, as she stepped off the cargo vessel Edward Richardson, which arrived today at Pier 100, South, below Oregon av., from Antwerp. The ship also carried ten war brides.

Her desire to become a dress designer was aided and abetted by her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Licht, of Forest Hills, L. I., who were on hand to greet her at the dock. Licht is in the textile business in New York.

Family was Killed

Miss Kohn, who speaks fluent English, said that she was in Warsaw in 1939 when the Germans captured the city. Her mother, father, and brother, were killed.

She joined the underground movement which resisted the Nazis, and in August, 1944, became a nurse with Polish forces inside the city.

In October she was captured by the Germans when the Poles staged an uprising and tried to break out of Warsaw to meet the advancing Russians.

Sent to a German prison camp at Oberlung, Miss Kohn was freed by the British last March. She was transferred to Belgium, where she volunteered to serve with the American Army.

Put in WAC Uniform

They put her in a WAC uniform and stationed her at Frankfurt, where she was assigned to the intelligence section.
