MOORE RIOTS IN STRIKE

Violence Rages in Several Places

One Dead in North Carolina; Guardsman Injured in Maine Stoning

Mediation Board's Report May Be Ready Today

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19. (AP)—Strike situation here is cloud-busting violence in scattered textile centers today as the Presidential mediation board neared the completion of a report putting into matter-of-fact language the statistical and human elements of the growing plant shutouts.

The thirteenth death of the walk-out occurred in North Carolina after a skirmish between pickets and National Guardsmen.

A National Guardsman was injured as troops on patrol duty at a Waterville (Me.) mill, scene of a hand-to-hand melee between police and strikers earlier in the day, were slowed by a group of men. Guardsmen were also injured in Waterville.

CLOSINGS AND OPENINGS

A survey of the Georgia situation, where martial law is in effect, shows some 2000 returning to the mills and a half dozen plants re-opening elsewhere.

Both unions and employers sought to moderate the strike in New Jersey the former asked injunctions restraining police from interfering with picketing.

Meanwhile Francis J. Gorman, national strike leader, announced the unions involved had voted finally to call off some 10,000 workers in the textile industry, previously unemployed by the walk-out.
