PARIS, July 19. — (P) — Crowds jammed into a mile square area around the Palace de L'Opera fought savagely with thousands of police and mobile guards tonight as the Government sought to suppress demonstrations against nation hooligans stormed through the Kuerfuerstendamm Cafe

demonstrations against nation-wide pay cuts. Fist fights added to the turmoil as police dragged hundreds of demonstrators a way to jail. Police clubs felled many, but hours after the fighting became general, there had been no serious interior second njuries reported. Police estimated that more than

Police estimated that more than 20,000 men and women had con-verged on the Place de L/Opera to protest the economy decrees ordered by Premier Pierre Laval to save the franc. Mounted Republican guards-men rode their horses sideways down the main avenues while massed groups of policemen with carbines forced back the crowds.
