He Tells Publishers Hitler's Big
Error Was Underestimating
U. S. Productive Speed

DEAR CALLS FOR VIGILANCE

Declaring that Adolf Hitler had made his "one great miscalcula-
tion" in failing to count on the
ability of American industry to
swing into war production as
quickly as it has, Donald M. Nel-
son, chairman of the War Produc-
tion Board, revealed yesterday that
United States airplane production
probably would reach the 7,000-a-
month rate this month, or come
close to it, and promised it would
keep on growing until it was as
large as needed.

The last previous figure on air-
plane production was released by
Under-Secretary of War Robert P.
Peterson last month, when he said
it had been established at 5,000 a
month.

Secret Polish Radio Asks Aid, Cut Off

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, April 21.—The secret Polish radio ap-
pealed for help tonight in a
broadcast from Poland and then
suddenly the station went dead.

The broadcast, as heard here,
said:

"The last 25,000 Jews in the
ghetto at Warsaw have been
condemned to execution. War-
saw again is echoing to mus-
ketry volleys."

"The people are murdered.
Women and children defend
themselves with their naked
arms."

"Save us..."

A United Press dispatch from
Stockholm quoted the broadcast
as speaking of "the last thirty-
five Jews in Warsaw," while Lon-
don listeners reported that the
broadcast had said that "the last
35,000 Jews in Warsaw's ghetto"
had been sentenced to death.
