Preface

The Passion Play has been performed in Oberammergau since 1634. The history of the text of the play shows continuous development over three centuries. The present text is a revision of the version made by the parish priest, J. Alois Daisenberger (1860), which in turn goes back to the script by Father Othmar Weis (1810). After the serious disputes in past years concerning the text of the play, the Parish of Oberammergau was induced to revise the text in order to take account primarily of Jewish objections, and to adapt it to the theological propositions of the Second Vatican Council. The revision has been made carefully, without breaking with tradition.

The Oberammergau Passion Play arises from a vow which was made, and aims at the same time to be a proclamation. It attempts to show the story of Jesus' sufferings, as told in the Gospels, in a popular way to believers and non-believers, to those in doubt and those who are seeking. Even though details in the text or in the performance may not be perfect, we may plead the words of the Apostle Paul: "Let Christ be proclaimed in every way!" This proclamation is made in the Passion Play not only by the text, but it is the combined effect of words and music, action and tableaux vivants, which produces such a deep impression on the audience. The tableaux vivants, which are taken from the Old Testament, show at the same time the rich spiritual heritage which is common to both Christians and Jews. Every individual, and mankind as a whole, must constantly be on guard against the temptation to shift the blame on to others. The Passion Play is not concerned to seek the guilty ones in the trial of Jesus. Holy Scripture includes all of mankind in the guilt for Jesus' death. However, the question of guilt is not the only issue. Before guilt stands the cross and the compassionate love of God, which became visible in His crucified Son who stretched out His arms to teach the whole world God's mercy.

In the Passion Play, the language of the action and the songs of the chorus call upon us to change our ways and repent, the play exhorts us to imitate the Lord carrying the cross and, in the final chorus, encourages us to believe and to have joyful hope.

In 1980 also may the stage of the Passion Play become a place of meeting with God for many of those who come to watch it. May the play of the suffering and death of Jesus be a profound religious experience for all those who see it.

Prologue

Salome: Here are the cloths in which the holy body was wrapped. It is no longer in the tomb.

Angel: Fear not, you seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He is not here, He has arisen from the dead! He will go on before you to Galilee. You will see Him there, as He told you.

Salome: Let us hurry and bring the joyful news to His disciples.

Magdalene: (steps back from the tomb)

Christ: Mary!

Magdalene: That is His voice! - Rabbuni!

Christ: Do not keep me. I have not yet gone up to my Father. But go to my brothers and tell them that I am going up to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.

Magdalene: He has disappeared; I can see Him no longer. — But I did see Him! I heard His voice! He lives! The Divine One, the merciful friend of sinners, He who makes blessed all who believe in Him! Oh, if only I could proclaim it throughout the whole world, so that mountains and rocks, heaven and earth should re-echo.

"Halleluja, He has arisen!"
