



19 DPA SERIES: THE NAZI HOLOCAUST — The Wobbelin concentration camp, ninety miles northwest of Berlin, and the Ebensee concentration camp in the Austrian Alps were liberated by allied troops in May, 1945. Ebensee was one of the largest and most brutal of the extermination centers. When liberated it held 60,000 prisoners of 25 different nationalities, all in various stages of starvation. The death rate was 2,000 a week. Above, (left) sick and half-starved prisoners are removed from Wobbelin camp, and (right) the typical condition of inmates found in the Ebensee camp, May 8, 1945.
