

DPA SERIES: THE NAZI HOLOCAUST - SERIES II — Despite the effort by the Germans to wipe them out by starvation, disease, or working them to death, the Jews continued to hang on to their culture within the ghetto. Although "illegal," the Jews listened to Allied radio broadcasts, published secret newspapers, kept records of what the Germans were doing to them, set up a variety of camouflaged workshops, established a network of clandestine schools for their children, and even attended lectures on cultural and political themes. The penalty for being caught in any of the above activities was immediate execution. The above photo aid shows a doctor visiting a house at 33 Nalewki Street, in the Warsaw Ghetto. 1941.

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
