She hai not aeen her family for some time of course, sone of Hing Ifve in Ingland and some in America. They of course think her to be in Poland. She weg dvidently for some time in the same Camp aim John Blcgs and has provised hin that hor first attempts will be to reach you.
ghe wishea you to contaot the Polish Authorities at Rubens Hotel, London, Polish HQ, and attempt to get her to England as soon as possible. She streasos the fact that she will not be a burden to you. She encloses a picture of herself ind John Bigge. She is in geod hoelth, and is being well cared for now.

Any communtoations you have for her may be addrossed to me er through PWX channels, the War Opfice.
I. hope that this manner of conveying the informetion to you will be satistactory.

Whank yow very much for your letter of the 28th April which I think is one of the nicest it has been my privilege to read. Yesterday, I took it to Mlle Zylingka who was yery moved in reading it. I also took the liberty of ahovilig it to the Commanaant, a very fine Polish woman in order that she might understand and be informed.

Nikka, as they call her is most anxious that you should know with what delight she read your letter and how much she thanks you for the sentiments which you express in it. She wants to thank you for your efforts on her behalf and to reiterate her great desire to get to England as soon as possible.

I dont know what we can do from this end but I am submitting her case to the Canadian Army authorities for consideration but I am convinced, however, that the best solltion lies with the Polish HQ in Iondon. Throumh their resources they might easily ask for Mlle Zylinska to be tramported to England for purposes which they must delineate. I am sure you are doing all you can to get them to act.
