RENOMINATION OF ROOSEVELT FACES BATTLE

Constitutional Democrats in 17 States Adopt Platform Aimed Against President

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—(Universal Service.)—Sounding a ringing denunciation of "Communist sympathizers" in the Roosevelt Administration, representatives of constitutional Democrats in seventeen states tonight laid down a platform on which they plan to block renomination of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The platform was made public by John Henry Kirby, wealthy Texan and chairman of the Southern Committee to Uphold the Constitution, now functioning actively in seventeen Southern and border states.

Contributor of huge sums to past Democratic campaigns and 100 per cent Roosevelt supporter in 1932, Kirby declared the object of his drive is to end "chiseling against the Constitution and force Presidential and Congressional Democratic tickets in 1936 to stand squarely on the Constitution."

He emphasized that his movement, backed by many nationally known Democrats, was not for a third party but to bring Jeffersonian Democracy back to the Democratic party.

Every informed American knows that if Mr. Roosevelt is re-elected in 1936 the sovereign rights of the people will be completely demolished, and power over all our affairs, little or big, will be consolidated in Washington.

7 POLICIES ADOPTED
Policies in coming primaries laid down as follows:
1. Insistence that Congress live up to its constitutional responsibilities of making laws.

2. Opposition to usurpation of power by public officials not specifically granted them under the Constitution.

3. Levy and collection of only such taxes as are necessary to the purposes of government economically administered.

4. Discontinuing use of public funds for the establishment of industrial enterprises to compete with private business.

5. Opposition to any amendment to the Constitution that will limit the power of the Supreme Court to declare an act of the National Legislature unconstitutional and void.

FLIP-FLOP STOMACH Hospital Patient Puzzles Doctors

WORK AT CALIENTE Long to Employ 50 as Relief Measure

SAN DIEGO, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Baron Long, president of the Agua Caliente Company, operators of the palatial plant across the Mexican border, tonight announced that fifty men will be put to work at once at the resort to relieve unemployment. The resort was closed several weeks ago, following a ban against gambling in Mexico. Meantime, a plan for reopening the resort will be presented to President Lazaro Cardenas in Mexico, D. F., according to Baja California officials.

THOMAS TULLY HELD IN ATTACK ON YOUNG GIRL

Suspect Claims He Is Son of Jim Tully, Novelist; Deputies Guard Prisoner From Mob

SUSANVILLE, Sept. 15.—Accused of brutally attacking a 16-year-old girl, near Westwood, Thomas Tully, 24, who claims to be the son of Jim Tully, "hobo" author, was being guarded tonight by authorities from angry lumberjacks who threatened to lynch him.

Additional deputies were summoned by Sheriff Ole Johnson when a crowd of lumber mill workers congregated on street corners and muttered threats against Tully.

The girl, Juanita Sheppard, was found unconscious in a dense wood near Westwood this morning by her father, who became worried over her long delay in returning from a party at the home of a girl friend.

Revised at a hospital, Miss Sheppard told authorities she went to the party with Tully and another girl. Returning to her home, she charged, Tully forced her into the woods and struck her a smashing blow on the jaw.

Several Arrests Mark Career

In the last six years, Thomas Alton Tully, 24-year-old red-headed son of Jim Tully, hobo author, has found himself in ten of the law several times for assault on girls and women.

In November, 1934, Superior Judge Charles W. Fricke sentenced the youth to serve six months in the county jail for assault on Marie Violet Robey of Modesto, Park.

Prior to that, approximately six years ago, he was accused by a young girl, who later refused to prosecute; another case in connection with an attempt to kidnap a 17-year-old woman netted him a probationary sentence of one year.

Miss Frances Charbonneau, 21-year-old waitress, charged the youth with sex offenses last April, but he was acquitted on the first ballot by a jury in Superior Judge Charles S. Burnell's court.

When released from incarceration in the Reby case last April, he went to Westwood, in Northern California, according to Mrs. Jim Tully, who last night said she had heard from him recently, and that he apparently was happy in his position with a lumber company there.

The woman, stepmother of Thomas Alton Tully, added she would communicate at once with her husband, absent from home for the night.

She said the family had received no word from northern authorities.

'No Further Concessions to Italy,' Selassie Bluntly Tells League; War Imminent

Hitler's Drastic Laws: GERMAN-JEWISH MARRIAGE BAN Creates Two Classes Citizens, Official Flag

By Arno Dosch-Fleuret (Copyright, 1935, Universal Service.)—Chancellor Hitler today withdrew through the German Reichstag without debate or opposition three drastic new laws, banning marriage of "Germans and Jews" under threat of prison, establishing two classes of German citizens, and proclaiming the Nazi swastika Germany's official flag.

Chancellor Hitler, addressing the specially convened Reichstag at the Nazi Party Congress here, at the same time proclaimed Germany's "desire for peace," promised to refrain from any hostile act against France or Austria, made known Germany's demand for return of the Memel territory, and attacked world Jewry for anti-Nazi agitation. He ridiculed reports Germany is preparing for an eventual war with Soviet Russia.

Of the three laws adopted by the Reichstag, under the whip-lash of Hitler's address and Prussian Premier Hermann Wilhelm Goerring's complete control of the Nazi legislative body, by far the most important were those dealing with the swastika flag and "mixed marriages."

Linking Nazi anti-Jewish measures with the liner Bremen riots in New York in July, and the freeing of five of six men then arrested by Magistrate He ridiculed reports Germany is preparing for an eventual war with Soviet Russia.

Russia Charges Nazi War Plan

MOSCOW, Sept. 15.—(Universal Service Special Cable.)—The Nazi Party Congress being held at Nuremberg is a definite step in Germany's war preparations, it was charged today in papers of the official Soviet press. The Government paper Ivestia declared: "To Nuremberg special trains carried 800,000 men in a few days. The trains moved on special schedules. All can understand that this is nothing but an enormous test of transport for mobilization purposes."

21 Cities Get New Labor Boards

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—A system of three-man regional agencies in twenty-one cities, including Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle to handle labor complaints under the Wagner Act was announced today by the new National Labor Relations Board.

15 FIGHT FANS HURT Bleachers Crash at Max Baer Camp

SPECULATOR, N. Y., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Fifteen persons were injured today when ringside bleachers at Max Baer's training camp collapsed, plunging 300 fight fans into a mass of tangled wreckage.

Most severely hurt were William Metz of Salsbury Center, N. Y., and Mrs. Donald Burch of Lake George, N. Y., who later were permitted by doctors to return home.

NEW AMPHIBIAN MARK Russian War Ace Clocks at 230 M.P.H.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 15.—(Universal Service.)—Maj. Alexander DeP. Seversky, former Russian war ace, blazed a new world record for amphibian planes today at the Michigan Air Circus above the Wayne County Airport.

Five-Point Peace Plan Believed Certain of Rejection

Latest developments in the Italo-Ethiopian crisis: GENEVA, — Emperor Haile Selassie refuses to make further concessions to Mussolini in fear of dethronement by rebellion of tribal chiefs. League of Nations committee to recommend international supervision of Ethiopia.

LONDON.—British Government urged to hold elections for purpose of obtaining mandate to arm completely. Financiers favorable to 500 million dollar "rearmament loan." Troop movements being made secretly to strengthen Egyptian garrisons bordering Italian Libya.

ROME.—Mussolini dispatches 40,000 troops to Libya and Tripoli, and 2300 more men to Ethiopia. Front, an inspired Fascist press accuses Britain of fomenting rebellion among Libyan tribes.

ADDIS ABABA.—Haile Selassie orders war drums ready to sound call to arms.

GENEVA, Sept. 15.—(Universal Service.)—Emperor Haile Selassie I of Ethiopia in a confidential message to high quarters in the League of Nations today refused to make further concessions to Italy, declaring that if he did his "tribal chiefs would rebel and dethrone him."

The Emperor's dispatch to his representatives here—a blunt but fearful rejection of Italian demands for complete control of Ethiopia—convinced European diplomats that an Italo-Ethiopian war cannot be averted by the League unless forceful action is taken against Italy by the 21 League members in Great Britain's "peace-at-any-price" camp.

Blasting hopes that Ethiopia might yield more ground in an effort to prevent bloodshed and havoc at the hands of Mussolini's modernized equipped legions, Emperor Haile Selassie declared: "I cannot agree to further sacrifices."

"I could not keep my throne if I did."

EXPERTS DELIBERATE

This startling message arrived during deliberations by experts of the League Council's "committee of five" representing England, France, Turkey, Spain and Poland, which met today to outline additional proposals for peace between Mussolini and the Ethiopian Emperor.

The Emperor's declaration that he could not keep his throne paralleled Mussolini's historical statement at Rome recently to Capt. Anthony Eden of Britain: "I must go on—my people expect it of me!"
