Deciding that Adolf Hitler had made his "one great miscalculation" in failing to count on the ability of American industry to swing into war production as quickly as it has, Donald M. Nelson, chairman of the War Production Board, revealed yesterday that United States airplane production probably would reach the 7,000-a-month rate this month, or come close to it, and promised it would keep on growing until it was as large as needed.

Secret Polish Radio Asks Aid, Cut Off

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, April 21.—The secret Polish radio appealed for help tonight in a broadcast from Poland and then suddenly the station went dead.

The broadcast, as heard here, said:

"The last 35,000 Jews in the ghetto at Warsaw have been condemned to execution, Warsaw again is echoing to mistletoe volleys.

"The people are murdered. Women and children defend themselves with their naked arms.

"Save us..."

A United Press dispatch from Stockholm quoted the broadcast as speaking of "the last thirty-five Jews in Warsaw," while London listeners reported that the broadcast had said that "the last 35,000 Jews in Warsaw's ghetto" had been sentenced to death.
