

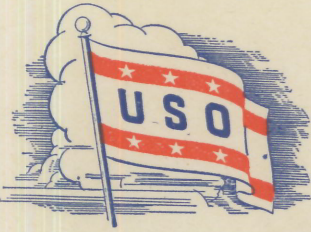

Hi kids. I never thought that I would write to you from a hospital bed but one never knows. And it looks as if I may be here for a couple of weeks. So while I am confined to bed I can write some long overdue letters. Also I beg you to answer soon by Air Mail so that I can get some mail while I am still here. In fact you might write to me two or three times by Air Mail & I would get it before leaving.

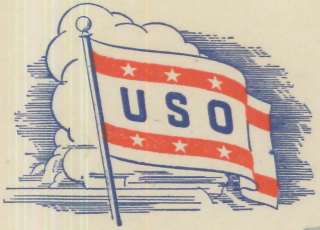

They give me good medical treatment good meals etc but I want to be out in the sun and doing things.

I hope that you are both well and happy. I pray for you faithfully.

I also am trusting in God to get me out of here well and ok again.



I have a genuine trust in the medical treatment that I am getting also. So I should be out of bed and ok again soon. The nurse says that I will be here a good two weeks though.
