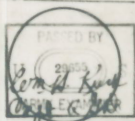

I have about enough time yet before time to go to work, that I can write another letter. So I will try to tell you more about what I have seen in England.

Most of the motor cars are English Austins. They are about half way between our Austins and an ordinary low priced car in size. They are all equipped with a steering wheel on the right hand side, though. The busses are double deck affairs also right hand driven. The streets here are very narrow, and the sidewalks are raised only a few inches from the street. There is practically no gutter. Bicycles are more plentiful in the streets than cars. Nothing is very much in fashion.

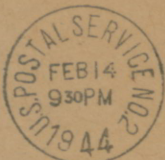
